What's On My Mind... **A Paradox of Confusion**

If you broach the subject of animal control with officials at any level of government, you are likely to be told there are several adequate laws and bylaws already in place. There may be laws, but the heartbreaking stories found on page 20 of this edition are prime examples of how ineffective they are, and how this gross lack of responsibility continues to be ignored, or, buried in a proverbial legal abyss.

It is public knowledge that on a national scale, Quebec's animal protection laws are considered among the lowest in the country and the province, shamefully, is well-known as the puppy mill capital of Canada. So, it was no surprise to find Quebec ranked 12th out of 13 on the June 2015 Animal Legal Defense Fund's annual report. What did surprise me was to see a staggering jump up to 6th place in 2016! (adlf.org). What happened?

On December 4, 2015, Quebec's National Assembly passed Bill-54 - An Act to improve the legal situation of animals in which, under the amended Civil Code of Quebec, animals were to be considered as sentient beings, with biological needs, rather than a piece of moveable property, such as a table. In spite of several limitations, the passing of Bill-54 was still a positive step forward for animal welfare in this province.

February 2016 showed another step forward when MP Nathaniel Erskine-Smith (Beaches-East York, Ontario) introduced a private member's bill - Bill C-246 -Modernizing Animal Protection Act – an Act to amend the Criminal Code, the Fisheries Act, the Textile Labeling Act, the Wild Animal and Plant Protection and Regulation of International and Interprovincial Trade Act, and the Canada Consumer Product Safety Act (animal protection).

The positive initiatives of these two Bills, one accepted and passed (December 2015), the other still pending at the time (February 2016), are very likely the reasons reflecting the substantial ratings increase on the ALDF reports, which are published in June. Both Bills presented a positive outlook for Quebec's new concern for animal welfare and control. And then everything changed.

In June 2016, following the fatal pit bull attack of Christiane Vadnais, fear and public outrage demanded stronger legislature against dangerous dogs. Government officials responded by targeting specific 'pit bull type' breeds and implementing the Breed Specific Legislation (BSL). Aggressive pit bull types could now be managed effectively, but the devastating fallout forced on those without aggressive tendencies, and to their families, was enormous, and served no end purpose. This separation of breeds also under-cut the standard behind Bill-54 with its implication that the protective cloak of "sentient beings" could still be revoked at any time.

After struggling past first and second readings, Bill C-246 was defeated in October 2016, through a series of polite and politically correct speeches. Major arguments centered on three main conflicts of interest and included statements quoting "... effective animal protection laws were already in place." All Members' comments are readily available at openparliment.ca - Bill C-246.

At the municipal level, animal bylaws, in several cases, were near identical with the highest concentration of Articles focused on regulations pertaining to licenses; updates ranged from 2000 to 2016; contact for animal control was inconsistent -clearly available on some sites but impossible to find on others - one municipality even provided an animal "Controller's" address, but no name or phone number; most mentioned contacting the SQ in emergency situations. Regardless of how strong the bylaws appeared on paper, all fail in effectiveness, if infractions are not reported.

This now brings us to the community level where people should be concerned about the safety of their families, pets, friends and neighbours. Oftentimes, people are aware of circumstances that warrant intervention, but choose not to get involved. Such was the case in at least one of the two recent attacks.

It is unacceptable that innocent people and loved pets must suffer the consequences of irresponsible owners, or, weak and confusing animal control laws. But, we too must share the responsibility. Community safety is everyone's business. Learn the bylaws pertaining to your municipality and report, to the proper authorities, all incidents involving aggressive dog behavior, neglect or abuse. By doing so, you are providing the animal controllers in your neighbourhood with the information they need to investigate further and, when warranted, implement an appropriate course of action.

valuable equipment and personnel. Also, it was an airfield that was not being used at the time. 
My conclusion is that this was indeed a false-flag operation, but it was planned by the good guys in the Trump camp, with the connivance of the Russians. It seems

Another very weird fact about this bombing is that Syria and Russia were given two hour's notice of the pending raid, allowing them time to clear the airfield of



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

Simply Words on Paper Necessity Is the Mother of Many Inventions in Cuba

A winter break in Cuba has become a tradition for many Canadians. The cost is not prohibitive; the people are open and very friendly. While I have

immensely enjoyed each of my visits, the shortages of consumer goods, tourist paraphernalia and many staple items, which are simply not available to the average Cuban, leave a somewhat bitter lasting impression.

Cubans can boast of two essential, undeniable assets required for economic and social development: the extremely high literacy rate, due to the stellar universal education programs and the quality of health care right down to the neighborhood or village level.

Whether you choose to blame outdated socialist policies, govern-

ment and bureaucratic bungling, the continuing American embargo or a combination of these three elements, the average Cuban who must make do with a monthly wage equivalent to about \$25, has had to develop creative innovations to compensate for the perennial lack of basic resources that we, in Canada, take for granted.

Public health

Some unexpected items, however, are not only readily available, but the supply exceeds any possible demand. Public health policies and sex education campaigns assure that the supply and distribution of condoms is efficient and abundant, so the ever-resourceful Cubans use what is available to them in non-traditional ways.

Because imported wine is too expensive, some Cubans make their own at home, extending the product by adding flavor from certain fruits. What began as an illicit backyard still for the Estevez family has now evolved into a lucrative winery. Some 500 five-gallon jugs are sealed with "condom corks." During fermentation, the wine releases gas, which is trapped by the condom, making it stand erect. Once the condom becomes flaccid again, it is time to bottle the product. Wine sales, for consumption in homes and in restaurants at a cost of only 10 Cuban pesos, or about 50 cents a bottle, amounts to an average of 50 bottles per day. Some of these wines are flavored with guava, watercress or beets.

Seawall

Most visitors to Havana have strolled along the Maleçon, the spectacular boulevard along the waterfront. Each night, a group of men can be seen "balloon fishing" along this seawall. They blow up the contraceptives to the size of balloons and tie them to the baited lines as floats to carry the lines, which can extend as far as 900 feet out to sea, with the tide.

Before the advent of "balloon floats" many fishers would risk Coast Guard crackdowns and heavy fines, riding out on inner tubes or large foam blocks in the hope of catching the favored bonito or red snapper species, since private boats and fuel are either too expensive or simply inaccessible.

Since it is illegal to sell fish without a license in Cuba, they claim to feed these fish only to family members, but it is far more lucrative to sell a 30-pound catch to restaurants at \$1/pound.

No rubber bands

Even very cheap items can be unavailable. A visitor leaving Cuba wanted to purchase a set of claves, a pair of wooden rods that serve as a traditional instrument to keep a musical beat. To try them, he removed what he expected to be a rubber band, but found instead that is was a rolled condom with the tip sliced off. The clerk explained: "we have plenty of condoms, but no rubber bands!"

Other uses include as birthday party decorations, for water balloon fights (this not limited to Cuba), to keep money and other valuables dry at the beach. A friend of mine even added an ingenious medical application. "When I was hospitalized in Guantanamo, they used one to cover the tip of the wand when they gave me an ultrasound," he recounted.





Deputy Yves St-Denis Announces Investments for Road Repairs

During the period 2017-2019, the Laurentian region will benefit from investments of \$ 189 million, which will be allocated by the Government of Québec to the regional road network to continue, or complete, work on 74 structures, 38 of which are part of the municipal network. Approximately 232 kilometers of roads will also be subject to various interventions, such as asphalting and pavement repairs. Healthy Channels Acne and Acupuncture

I think most of us have been there at some point in our lives, looking in the mirror and noticing a pimple. It inevitably arrives right before an import-

ant date, meeting, or interview. Acne is the accumulation of more pimples than just one or two. It most commonly affects teenagers and, for most people, it goes away by age 30, but some older people can still get acne.

Acne is a disease that affects the skin's oil glands. The small pores in your skin connect to oil glands under the skin, which make an oily substance called sebum. The pores connect to the glands by a canal called a follicle. Inside the follicles, oil carries dead skin cells to the surface of the skin. When the follicle of a skin gland clogs up, a pimple grows. Most pimples are found on the face, neck, back, chest, and shoulders. Acne is not a serious health threat, but it can cause scars.

There are many types of pimples. The most common types are:

- Whiteheads: these are pimples that stay under the surface of the skin.
- Blackheads: these pimples rise to the skin's surface and look black.
- Papules: these are small pink bumps that can be tender.
- Pustules: these pimples are red at the bottom and have pus on top.
- Nodules: these are large, painful, solid pimples that are deep in the skin.
- Cysts: these deep, painful, pus-filled pimples can cause scars.

The cause of acne is unknown, however doctors think certain factors might cause it, such as: the increase in hormones in teenage years, hormone changes during pregnancy, starting or stopping birth control pills, heredity, some types of medicine, and greasy makeup.

Acne is most commonly treated by dermatologists. They most frequently would prescribe acne medications to put directly on the skin, or other medicines that you swallow. The lack of dermatologists in the Laurentian region is still a shock to me.

Here are some ways to care for your skin if you have acne:

- Clean skin gently, using a mild cleanser.
- Try not to touch your skin. Squeezing, pinching, or picking at pimples can create scars.
- Stay out of the sun. Many acne drugs can make people more likely to sunburn.
- Choose makeup carefully. All makeups should be oil-free. Look for the word 'noncomedogenic' on the label. This means the makeup will not clog up your pores.

Many people come to acupuncture for acne after trying everything else under the sun. Acupuncture has been used to treat skin diseases for thousands of years, and works by correcting the root cause of acne. Your acupuncturist will consider the location and nature of your acne. I've found that digestion and hormones are most often central in understanding the cause of the acne and can be helped and corrected with acupuncture.

Fit Tip #114 The Reptilian Brain & Our Health

Our brain is actually three separate brains, from three very different stages of evolution, each with a unique function. Your body's preferred state of health for this situation is low-grade depression, combined with physical decay. Biologically, there is only growth and decay. In our 40's and 50's, our bodies switch into a "default to decay" mode. We can override these default signals, and change decay back into growth, by changing the signals we send to our bodies. 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




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Up Close...

Josephine Piazza's mission is to teach self-care

Josephine Piazza is rapidly making her mark by teaching chair-adapted yoga to seniors and special interest groups, including people challenged by Parkinsons, Alzheimers, and cancer. Her personal journey has been punctuated by a series of life-altering experiences that have culminated in arriving recently at her life's purpose, here in the Laurentians.



Given her interest in nature and the environment, it is fitting that she was born on Earth Day, April 22, 1966, in Windsor, Ontario. Her parents immigrated from Italy, and despite their lack of formal education (Mom Grade 3 and Dad Grade 5), they built a successful General Store from scratch. Josephine was raised behind the counter where, despite her shyness, she learned how to deal effectively with people from all walks of life.

Armed with a Bachelor of Commerce (Honours) degree in administration, she began her climb up the corporate ladder, at Birks Jewellers (established in 1879) in Toronto, where she rose to the level of Regional Vice-President, with a six-figure income. After eight years, the glitter wore off, and she became disenchanted with what she felt was the "...heartless nature of corporate life." She needed a change, which resulted in her moving to Montreal, where she became fluent in French, (adding to her proficiency in Italian and Sicilian).

Meanwhile, she was dealing with the aftermath of a serious car accident (1996), that caused her to be hurled through the windshield, resulting in chronic back pain. After several years of physical therapy and alternative remedies, Josephine discovered yoga, which had an immediate effect on her quality of life, and led her to book over 350 hours of yoga study. Her initial purpose was not to teach, but to understand how her body was reacting to her brain. A new lifestyle path was emerging for her.

At the age of 42, she gave birth to her daughter, Alessandra. It was becoming clear to Josephine that she was meant to help others to learn how to care for themselves, through the practice of therapeutic yoga with essential oils. She devoted herself to working with children, seniors and those who are challenged by debilitating diseases. She points out that Health Canada states that physical inactivity is a principal cause of chronic diseases associated with aging.

Josephine gravitated to the Laurentians, whose rolling hills remind her of Sicily. "I knew it was where I needed to be and the ideal place to raise my daughter" she told me. "Je suis bien ici." When she decided to devote her professional life to self-care, she took on any jobs she could find. Her love of helping others led her to becoming a franchisee of "Yoga tout," which involves teaching chair-adapted yoga to various groups and individuals, and "Yoga Kids."

I asked her specifically about working with seniors and the methodology of "Yoga tout." As one of her students, I am participating in a 14-week program designed to help us become more autonomous. We are learning a series of classic postures, done while seated on a chair to ensure safety. She explained that each posture has been chosen for its benefits to the body and spirit. Special attention is paid to the joints, as they allow the body to move, touch and hold objects. We learned that a great deal of tension can accumulate in these parts of the body, preventing the circulation of energy.

She went on to describe how our joints ensure flexibility, mobility and adaptability of the body. "Yoga postures lubricate the joints, making them more flexible, for a longer and more active life. The postures are excellent for relieving rheumatism, arthritis, high blood pressure and heart problems. They are recommended for eliminating blockages of energy in the joints and extremities."

Josephine's personal mission is "...to teach self-care, and pass along the tradition of yoga as a daily personal hygiene system for life, in order to remain autonomous." She delivers her training with a willing body, a focused mind, and an open heart that my classmates and I find totally fulfilling. THE LIBRARY HAS BEEN RELOCATED FOR THE DURATION OF THE RENOVATION PERIOD

The Gaston-Miron Library reopened its doors at a temporary location on February 20, to allow for the renovation currently taking place in its original location in the building on Saint-Vincent Street.

Temporarily situated at 14, Saint-Antoine Street, across from the Commission Scolaire des Laurentides, the Gaston-Miron Library offers a selection of books for children and adults. Opening hours will remain unchanged, and are as follows: Mondays and Fridays from noon to 6 pm, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9 am to 6 pm and Saturdays from 9 am to 5 pm.

In the meantime, the building situated at 83, Saint-Vincent Street will undergo a total makeover. While the building is brought up to current norms, the renovation will transform it to almost double its size, increasing its surface from 415m² to 818m², enabling it to offer services that meet the standards of today's Québec libraries.

The expansion project provides the use of a second floor with a lift installation, a multipurpose room, seating for work and reading, and an attractive and stimulating youth section.

On the ground floor, you will find the reception area, the loans desk, an area to accommodate teens, work computers and of course, collections of books and documentaries, which can be significantly enhanced over time thanks to the increase in size of the new installations.

The project will take place over the course of at least 1 year, and the grand reopening should



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take place in the spring of 2018.

Garden Talk **DIY Seed Starters**

When transplanting young seedlings, it can be a challenge to get these baby plants carefully nestled into the garden without disturbing their immature roots. Tapping or tipping them gently out of mini

plastic pots, or seedling dividers, can go smoothly. But if things go wrong, and some roots or the entire root ball gets left behind, the future success of the seedling is in jeopardy.

Using biodegradable seedling containers that can be planted in the ground, right along with the seedling, is a great way to solve this problem. Commercial options, made from peat, coco fiber, or even cow manure, are available at local garden supply outlets. Fortunately, it's easy to make your own simple and economical seedling containers out of biodegradable things found around the house.

A cardboard egg carton is one of the easiest options. (Don't use the Styrofoam or plastic cartons; they are not biodegradable.) Simply fill the little egg carton cups with light potting soil and plant seeds directly. By the time the seedlings are ready to transplant, the carton should be easy to tear into sections for planting directly into soil outdoors

Or you can transform empty toilet paper rolls into perfect little seed holders. Cut a

roll in half, this will make two containers. Make four slits in each roll to about a third of the way up. Fold these in like you would to close a box; this forms the bottom of the container. Fill it with potting soil and pack it down with your thumbs. Plant your seeds of choice to the proper depth noted on the package. Water well and keep moist. Place these mini pots on a plastic tray or saucer. No special drainage holes are needed, as the cardboard/paper will wick away the excess moisture. Empty paper towel rolls or giftwrap rolls can also be used as long as they are made of lightweight, flexible cardboard.

To make seedling pots out of newspaper, cut strips about 3 inches wide by 12 inches long. Place two or three layers together; then roll the strips to form a tube around a kitchen spice bottle, or something similar -- approx. diameter of 1.5 to 2 inches. Dip the lower half-inch of this tube in water to soften, then fold in to create the bottom of the seedling container. When you remove the bottle, the tube will keep its shape making it ready for soil and planting.

If you have a box of stale ice cream cones in the cupboard, they can be repurposed as biodegradable seedling containers too. They're already pre-formed and ready to use. Because the cones generally contain sugar, be mindful that you could attract ants , depending on where you place the seedlings.

Egg shells are the ultimate biodegradable, natural option. When cooking breakfast, try to carefully crack off just the top third of the egg shell. Rinse and let air dry. Proceed to fill with soil, and plant as noted above. Be sure to poke a small hole in the bottom of the shell to allow for drainage. Any egg carton can be used to support these shell planters.

There is still plenty of time to start seeds in mid-April, as most annual flowers and vegetables should be seeded indoors, approximately six weeks before the last possible frost date in our area.

So, consider giving some of these biodegradable do-it-yourself options a try, and keep your precious seedling roots safe.

Twenty-five years ago, Lucille Green was a founding member of the Cosy Corner group for seniors. Then, there were 15 members, today there are 65 members. At the "tender" age of 80, Lucille still has lots of energy, enthusiasm and excellent organizational skills.

The Cosy Corner group meets every Tuesday, at noon, to enjoy a small meal together, for \$4, at the United Church, 831 Village Road, Morin Heights. The meal consists of a hearty homemade soup, fruit and cookies. It's a place where seniors share conversations and meet new friends. After lunch, people play bingo, board games or cards. Tea is served with crackers and brie at 3 pm. The youngest member of the group is 60 years old, and the oldest is 94.



The purpose of the Cosy Corner group is to break isolation for seniors and to provide a warm, friendly ambiance where they can meet, no matter their religions, backgrounds or age. Lucille claims that the group is so successful due to volunteers who are always ready to help. What is Lupus?

Lupus is a chronic disease with a variety of symptoms caused by inflammation in one or more parts of the body. The most common type of lupus is SLE (systemic lupus erythematosus). It is a complex and baffling condition that can target any tissue or organ of the body, including skin, muscles, joints, blood and blood vessels, lungs, heart, kidneys, and the brain. There are other types of lupus, which mainly affect the skin.

What causes lupus?

No one knows for sure. What we do know is that, in lupus, the immune system (the body's defense against viruses and bacteria) is unable to tell the difference between intruders and the body's own tissues. Trying to do its job, it attacks parts of the body, causing inflammation and creating the symptoms of lupus. Until science fully understands how the immune system works, the specific cause of lupus remains unknown.

What are the symptoms of lupus?

Because it can target any of the body's tissues, lupus is often hard to pin down or diagnose. That's why it is called "the disease with 1000 faces."

Living with lupus: what to expect

A chronic illness, lupus is different for each individual, but it often appears in cycles. Lupus is a serious condition, but diagnosis and treatment are improving. Today it can be treated and controlled.



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Living with lupus: what helps?

One thing that makes a huge difference in living with lupus is the person's role in controlling the disease. We can deal better with the challenge of living with this or any chronic condition by learning all we can about the condition and by being aware of how our own body reacts. The strong support of family and friends can be equally important. Membership in lupus organizations can also help meet the challenge.

David Birnbaum Brings Parkinson's Awareness to the National Assembly

On April 6, Mr. David Birnbaum, Member of the National Assembly for D'Arcy-Mc-Gee and Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Education and the Minister of Higher Education, will be making a declaration in support of Parkinson Canada for Parkinson Awareness Month. The statement will be made in the National Assembly and will discuss the 200th anniversary of the first report of the disease by James

Parkinson, the far reaching effects of this condition and Parkinson Canada's initiatives to help people in Quebec living with Parkinson's.

"Parkinson's is the second most important neurodegenerative disease and the population affected by it is expected to double within the next 15 years. I thought it necessary to put on the record of the National Assembly this vital concern and to apprise Quebecers of the

importance of research and treatment," said Mr. Birnbaum.

A few facts about Parkinson's disease:

• 100 000 Canadians, including 25 000 Quebecers, live with Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's Disease

- One out of five is younger than 50 years of age.
- More than half will need formal or informal assistance for their daily living.
- Health care professionals from a dozen specialties may be needed to treat the symptoms of Parkinson's disease.
- Motor symptoms include: rigidity, slowness, posture and gait changes as well as tremor.
- There are about 20 possible non-motor symptoms of Parkinson's disease, ranging form sleep disorders, depression and incontinence to speaking and swallowing difficulties.

For Parkinson Awareness Month, Parkinson Canada will be hosting a bilingual symposium for people with Parkinson's and their loved ones. It will be held at the Gelber Conference Centre in Montreal on April 26, 2017, and will focus on Parkinson's medications and the impact of exercise on drug intake. Sadie – A Victim of Irresponsibility Debbie-Lynn & Travis - our heartbreaking story...

Sadie was the most beautiful and loving husky you could imagine. She loved children, cats and dogs, and didn't have a mean bone in her body. Sadie wasn't just a dog to Debbie-Lynn, she was her emotional support, and had been her best friend for the past 7 years, since she tragically lost her father. Sadie worked and travelled with us, and slept by our sides every night. She was our family.



On the evening of March 19, 2017, at approximately 7 pm, I took Sadie on a walk along our usual route around the town of St-Andre d'Argenteuil. On our way home, I noticed two loose

dogs on the street. I was familiar with this pair, as I usually see them locked in an outdoor enclosure, resembling a chicken coop. I altered my path, and chose a different route home, down a dirt/snow track that passes in front of a daycare centre.

I had almost reached the daycare centre when the two dogs came running up behind me, and the most terrifying and heart-breaking experience of my life began. The dogs attacked Sadie violently; one latched his jaws onto her body and the other attacked her hind end. Somehow, I managed to get both dogs off and lie on top of Sadie, but they were relentless, trying to bite at any gap they could, biting my arms and legs as I tried to protect her. I screamed for help, and it seemed like an eternity as I battled these two monsters, in a vain attempt to save Sadie. A man stood watching from about 100m away. I screamed desperately to him to help me, but he stood there, and did nothing.

Eventually, Simon Constantin heard our cries and came to help and, between us, we were able to hold the dogs at bay while Sadie ran off. She made it home to Debbie-Lynn, and was rushed to the emergency clinic in Laval, where the vets on duty said they had never seen injuries this bad from a dog attack. It would take weeks of experimental surgeries (estimated at \$20,000) with risks of further complications, and no guarantees as to the outcome. If she survived, Sadie would suffer from incontinence for the rest of her life. We battled with the toughest decision of our lives, and eventually decided it was more humane to let her go...

We are struggling to adapt to life without Sadie, and keep expecting to see her come running down the stairs with her big goofy smile, but the house remains silent. We miss her dearly. Nothing feels real, and we can't get past this nightmare.

The most frustrating thing is that this was preventable. After our story hit the media, several other residents came forward with their experiences with the same dogs that were frequently loose, unsupervised, chased children, attacked other dogs, cats, and trapped people in their cars. The community lived in fear of them.

The owner had been warned by authorities, and was well aware he had dangerous animals, but continued to keep them in an insecure 'kennel' from which they frequently escaped.

The behavior of these two dogs, and the potential risk they posed to the community, had been brought to the attention of the authorities several times, and yet no appropriate action had been taken. Unfortunately, the bylaws in place were not properly enforced, and our dear Sadie paid the ultimate price with her life for this lack of responsibility, buried beneath a myriad of excuses.

If people know there are dangerous dogs in their communities, they need to report them for the safety of their loved ones, and for the welfare of the dogs, and insist proper action is taken. More is lost by indifference than by making a wrong choice. If bylaws aren't changed, and enforced properly, this tragic situation will be repeated.

Please don't let that happen.

Editor's note: The two dogs were subsequently euthanized after being surrendered to animal control by their owner.

My Loss of Punky



Punky jumped into my arms the moment we met and forever

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after, remained at my side. He had previously been abandoned by several owners, who never took the time to take him for walks, teach him tricks, or, more importantly, show him affection and provide him with the proper care.

On March 7, we were returning home from our evening walk and, as we neared the apartment door, I released Punky's leash. Almost immediately, I heard someone speaking loudly, and as I turned, saw the owner of two large dogs waving at me to get my attention.

Frantically, I ran trying to reach Punky before the dogs did, while screaming at their owner to please keep his dogs back. He just stood there, and did nothing. I was too late. In the blink of an eye, Punky was grabbed by his head and neck and thrown several feet into the air, before landing like a rag doll in the middle of the street. His injuries were severe and he was not moving. Immediately, I rushed him to the Blainville ER clinic, where they tried everything possible to save his life, but to no avail. Subsequently, Punky suffered 2 heart attacks, was diagnosed with brain damage, and the only humane option was to have him euthanized.

I am heart-broken over Punky's death, and his loss leaves an empty space in my heart. He was a sweet and loving friend, and did not deserve to die in such a violent manner.

The police were called, and a report was made, and then passed on to the SPCA-LL. At this time, the investigation is on-going.

Zach Factor Global Food Supply: Of What Came First

For those of us boomers, who wax nostalgic for electric streetcars, Expo 67, and beer in stubby brown bottles, who, among us expat Montrealers, cannot remember heading down to Elmhurst Dairy, on St. Jacques Street, on a hot evening, to enjoy a double scoop of our favorite ice cream, in a biscuit cone, while sitting under its two iconic cows, Elsie and Elmer? The ice-cream bar closed in 1978; the dairy was bought by the multi-national Parmalat Dairies in 1997, and the cows went into a dingy storage room next to the dairy. The Elmhurst brand still exists, with a 90-year old operation in Queens, New York. The fate of Elsie and Elmer is somewhat analogous today to the eventual doom of the entire dairy and meat industry that lies ahead in the 21st century.

Our stomachs have changed:

According to the latest research study released by Technavio, the global lactosefree food market is expected to reach over US \$10 billion in revenue by 2020. "Lactose intolerance is the inability of the body to digest significant amounts of lactose present in milk. The demand for lactose-free food products is driven by the increase in incidences of food allergies and intolerances. It has been observed that lactose intolerance is seen in approximately 90% of adults in East Asia," said Vijay Sarathi, one of Technavio's lead analysts for the food and beverage research company. Anyone considering investing in cattle and animal farm industries today should have serious second thoughts.

We are no longer happy with how cattle are treated on industrial farms. We search out sellers of free-range, organic-fed chickens after watching videos from PETA (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals). Images of caged chickens, with deformed limbs, pigs that never see daylight, cows brutally slaughtered, and other abusive animal husbandry practices, are perplexing even to the most die-hard meat eaters. On modern dairy farms, cows are handled less than kindly: they are forcibly inseminated, and most are kept inside in concrete pens. Their calves are separated from them shortly after birth, and given a formula diet, instead of mom's high quality affection. Male calves are butchered for veal. Females are raised to produce more milk for years, until they are considered "spent" and sent to slaughter. It's an unnatural cycle that we collectively have chosen to ignore in the name of blue cheese, or Greek-style yogurt.

The cost of raising these animals exceeds practicality. The amount of dwindling supplies of fresh water required by beef and dairy cows rests between 30 -50 liters per day. The price of feed, such as soya and corn, are soaring as grain production becomes more expensive. It's easier to bypass the cow altogether: cook the soya beans, and add the water to make soy milk, saving heating bills, veterinary care, antibiotics and other kinds of yardage costs. Not many of us have purchased AAA rib steaks lately.

Here comes the emergence of the animal-free, meat industry of tomorrow. Today, groups like San Francisco-based Memphis Meats, are cultivating exceptionally tasty chicken in laboratory petri dishes, without an egg. The old riddle is finally answered, what came first? It is neither chicken nor egg, but rather the stem cells. Without caging and harming animals, scientists are producing beef, pork and chicken, with great flavors and genuine texture that rival Alberta's feedlot products. Bypassing the feeding and care of animals, this kind of "clean meat," as it is referred to, will be on the mass market by 2021, as it is going through rigorous consumer testing at this time.

Meanwhile in Queens:

Elmhurst dairy closed down after 90 years, and is reopening as a completely plant-based milk company. Making their debut at the Natural Foods Expo West in California, their new brand is called "Milked." Elmhurst CEO, Henry Schwartz, explained that they have been operating at high costs in recent years and that "pasteurized milk has sort-of gone out of style." He claims that his Milked line will address the rising demand for non-dairy "milks and ice creams." Since 1970, cow milk consumption has fallen over 40% in the US, and dairy alternatives have soared by 30% since 2011. Internet grocery deliveries of non-dairy products are



The Story Behind Swisski part 2

Rolland Belhumeur was a ski pioneer who started a ski school for kids when he was 26, in 1940. He was way ahead of the rest of the ski industry, even

though people like Emile Cochand taught children as well as adults much earlier. The need for this specialized teaching was made clear to the renowned ski historian and journalist for La Presse Lucien Lachapelle in 1950. It was a lovely winter morning and he was admiring the results of a huge new snowfall at Mont St. Aubain in Val David (near Mont Plante). He watched a school bus carrying teenagers from L'Association des clubs de ski de Montréal as the students disgorged in great excitement. They went straight to the ski lift, impatient for that first run in the deep new snow, and as he watched them ski down, their skills obviously challenged, they began to fall. To his horror, three of the falls resulted in broken legs. He felt something had to be done.

In 1953, he and his friend, Canadian Ski Instructors' Alliance examiner Raymond Lanctôt, founded a school to train French-speaking amateur ski instructors. They approached Rolland Belhumeur to help train the new teachers.

Rolland was dedicated to teaching skiing and his life revolved around safety in sports. In 1958 he built a ski shop for Bill Glass and Irwin Elton, moving his own family in upstairs. In the summer, when Bill and Irwin went back to their



careers in golf, Rolland found other uses for the shop. People like Roger Thibaut worked there, fixing motors for the motorboaters on the lake. Come winter, though, its main vocation was as the Igloo Sport Shop. Igloo prospered and soon became a fixture in Ste. Agathe.

The story of Bill Glass and his partner Elton Irwin was written up in the Sporting Goods Merchandiser in 1960. They started in 1954 with a combined capital of \$200 and others in the industry predicted that they would last maybe two months, but by the time the article was published, they had incorporated Igloo Import and Supply Co. Ltd., were installed in Belhumeur's building and had an outlet in Town of Mount Royal. Of course, they had a lot of support in Ste. Agathe. To paraphrase an African proverb, 'It takes a village to raise a... business,' they always appreciated their Ste. Agathe roots. Eventually they acquired the building from Rolland Belhumeur and, with that kind of growth, they needed good people in the store. That's where Shirley Hoyer came back into the story. She had a good background in skiing and was working for Stina Badenduck at her giftshop. When they got too busy at Igloo, Stina helped by lending Shirley to them and eventually Shirley found herself there fulltime. That was back in the mid-seventies and with the growth of their import and distribution side, the building itself was becoming redundant. Shirley and her husband René Wachter watched. There was something here. In 1979, they bought the store and renamed it Swisski.

Igloo still exists, although the partners eventually sold to Igloo Vikski, and today the company thrives as a subsidiary of Raymond Lanctôt Ltd., the same Raymond Lanctôt who had appealed to Rolland Belhumeur for help teaching the youngsters in Montreal in 1953.

René and Shirley had a summer business selling mostly beachwear to the people around the lake and they prospered through the '80s and '90s, but as René will tell you, there was always a lot of competition. There was Sports Experts, Denis Parent, Jacques Champoux, Kanuk and Sports Laurentides. They needed to specialize. With the competition willing to invest a lot of money to represent downhill brands, René and Shirley developed their expertise in cross-country. It didn't take long for them to become the go-to people for their sport and, until 1996, the summer inventory contributed to their prosperity. That year, though, Shirley experienced the second fire that would punctuate her life. The windows were lit up with defective lighting and passers-by alerted the fire department. The wires had caught fire. It was not the window display they had intended.René took the call at their home on Hillside and came over to inspect. In his dry way, he told Shirley when he got back that she would have the rest of the summer off. The summer inventory and the building had sustained damage. They were insured and they dumped the surviving inventory at low prices and took a break while repairs were being made.

They enjoyed that summer and they soon realized they could easily live solely on the winter revenue. Thereafter, they closed for the summers. René's technical expertise and Shirley's management carried them through twenty more winters – until the next fire.

It was early morning on September 28, 2015. They were living in the apartment above the store and Betty, Shirley's younger sister, was visiting. The firemen pounded on the door and told them all to get out – leave everything and go. Shirley remembers watching the fire progress through the neighbour's building with its stores, café and apartments. Everything they owned was inside their own building but they could not go in.

The fire spared their building but water damage destroyed René's equipment in the basement. They would see how it went that winter, but they were pretty sure that it was time to close. The tools were a part of who René was. It was past time to retire. They'd earned it and, as René said, the industry was changing anyway. Carrying other company's products, they could not easily sell online and most of the market was moving there.

René and Shirley were a presence on the corner of Rue Principale and Rue St. Louis in Ste. Agathe for 38 years. They epitomized the independent Laurentian ski shop, and their closure ends an era. Still, as Shirley might tell you, fire is a harsh master.

The English Link It's Income Tax **Time ... Beware** of Scams

Beware of fraud schemes indicating they are associated with the Canada Revenue Agency. I recently received a press release in French from the Sûreté du Québec (SQ) and thought that I would share the following information with you.

During tax time, the SQ would like to advise people to be more vigilant when giving out personal information. Fraud schemes pretending to be associated with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) are much more prevalent at this time of the year. Be on the lookout for two different types of fraud.



One type of fraud occurs by telephone. The person will explain that you owe a sum of money and a payment must be made quickly in order to avoid being arrested by the police. You may be instructed to bring money quickly to a currency exchange office or immediately pay through prepaid credit cards, iTunes gift cards or other prepaid gift cards.

Another type of fraud occurs by email. You may be sent a link to a fake CRA website stating that you are entitled to a tax refund; you may be instructed to click on a link to update your tax records, or you may be instructed to verify your identity by entering personal information. You may be told your personal information is required so that you can receive a payment.

The CRA never requests taxpayers to provide personal information (such as a social insurance number, credit card number, bank account number, or passport number) by email or telephone. Normally, government agencies will only send written notices about your tax situation by mail. No matter how 'official' the person sounds on the other end of the line, or, in the email, do not give them any personal information and definitely do not transfer any funds to them.

Helpful Tips

Remember: If someone asks you to transfer funds, it is probably a fraud.

Be careful: Never send money, bank data, or credit card information to someone you do not know and/or do not trust.


Ask yourself these two questions: Am I being asked to provide information that I would not normally give in my income tax return? Am I being asked to provide information that the CRA already has on file?

If you have signed up for email notifications (available from the CRA through My Account, My Business Account, and Represent a Client), the CRA will do the following:

- send a registration confirmation email to the address you provided for online mail service for an individual or a business
- send an email to the address you provided to notify you when new online mail is available to view in the CRA's secure online services portal.

THE ROLE OF RISK TOLERANCE AND YOUR RETIREMENT INCOME

An important part of retirement involves figuring out what you'd like to do when you stop working, and then implementing an investment savings and income strategy that can help you achieve your goals. It's key that you be comfortable with this strategy, so that you can sleep at night. If your strategy weighs heavily on your mind, it may be time to reassess the investment products you've chosen, and it's also certainly time to assess your tolerance for investment risk.

Different types of investment products offer trade-offs in terms of risk. Those that are considered conservative (less risky), such as GICs and bonds, generally won't offer significant market gains, but the chances of losing significant value in those investments during market downturns is low. 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I'm Just Saying "Stop" Before it's Too Late


While I am not certain whether it is a result of the public outcry we witness on a daily basis in

the United States, as Trump puts out one dangerous bill after another, a Brexit reaction, or something else, I am heartened to see Anglophones in Quebec finally emboldened enough to demand from our government bilingual road signs in our province.

This is not a question of language, as the CAQ's Legault, and the P.Q.'s Lisee would have you believe; it is a question of safety for all of us, no matter what your background may be. Legault stated recently that this would infringe on the French language, in spite of the distinct (pardon the irony) allowance in Bill 101 to have both languages present where public safety is concerned. If politicians can talk from both sides of their mouths, depending on the audience, then surely we can have two internationally recognized languages on our roadways.

The sensibility and practical rationale for the inclusion of English on major roadway signs, in the form of a petition, was joined by more than 7000 Quebecois from all walks of life, and was recently brought to the National Assembly for debate. I suggest that this logical request is akin to expecting, not asking, for bilingual signage at hospitals so that the health and safety of all Quebecois can be a primary concern we share.

Legault's tired rhetoric aside, do we all not realise that tourists from foreign destinations, such as Alberta or California, would be putting peoples' lives in danger by not being able to understand our French-only road signs? It is bad enough that some words on our uni-lingual road signs do not directly translate into clear information. I challenge you to look at how the province describes "turn on your lights", or the infamous "R" word indicating you are going the wrong way on a ramp, and you will see that even those who may have some basic French in their educational background might not comprehend the message. This is a public safety issue, nothing more!

The park received financial assistance in the amount of \$500,000 from the Canada Economic Development for Quebec Regions under the Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program and a total contribution of \$500,000 from the 4 MRC participants (Antoine-Labelle, Laurentides, Pays-d'en-Haut and Rivière-du-Nord). This one million dollar amount will be invested along the trail. Several upgrades are planned, which will include replacing culverts, new asphalting, stabilizing embankments and ditches, and more.

As a consequence of all this work, the opening of the linear park is scheduled for June 24, 2017. However, it is expected that it will be accessible as of mid-May, depending on climatic conditions. During the planned work, some sections may be temporarily closed. Wherever possible, a detour marked by the surrounding roads will be proposed, or, alternatively, a shuttle transport system, if a detour is not possible. 
Lac St-Victor Estate Wins Double Recognition

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


