






What's On My Mind... Local markets – a growing trend...

Observations Brexit and the Shredding of Europe

This British referendum over whether to remain in the EU or not, was promised to the citizens by Prime Minister, David Cameron, as a campaign sop to win the election that put him in the driver's seat. He fully expected the population to vote to remain in the EU, particularly after so many "experts" had warned about the dangers of an exit and the prospect of the loss of markets and jobs.

The battle was between the leave side - Brexit - and the stay side - Bremain. To put this contest in other terms, this was a matter of the great unwashed, working class and middle class against the elites, conservatives, bankers and politicians. Contrary to all the polls and the bookmakers, the Brexit side won, 52% 48%. Britain was changed, fundamentally, on that night of June 23rd, 2016. The Brexit vote was an EU-shattering, world-econo-

my-shattering event, the consequences of which will continue to be felt around the world as the rest of this year goes by.

The people have spoken. They have rejected control from above. The EU is controlled by a group of un-elected, un-accountable bureaucrats, whose only objective

has been to increase the power of the EU, while denying any expression of individuality by its constituent members. The European Union was originally organised to foster closer ties between former rivals, to stop wars between nations and to promote free trade within the European continent. Their currency, the Euro, was intended to be a unifying symbol of a unified region.

Unfortunately, the EU has morphed into a twisted, repressive travesty of its model, with the European Parliament over-riding all member states' parliaments and the European Court of Justice dictating laws that supersede individual states' laws. There-

fore the sovereignty of member states has been abnegated, as well as their freedom to choose their individual destinies. Despite the EU founders' hope of achieving a sense of "European-ness," individual national identities have been guarded fiercely, as well as languages and cultures. It was insanity for unelected bureaucrats to attempt to rule over 500 million disparate people.

Increasingly, the EU has become a barrier to trade by imposing ridiculous restrictions and regulations. "Today, there are restrictions governing how "bendy" a banana must be - not bendy enough and it doesn't meet regulation. Cucumbers, on the other hand, can't be too bendy. Water retailers are banned from suggesting water would hydrate you. Prunes are not laxatives, turnips cannot be called swedes, and eggs are not allowed to be sold by the dozen - only by weight. Powerful vacuum cleaners are banned - they use too much energy. When looking at the sheer weight of unexplainable laws, you're left thinking only a mentally ill person could have put them together - and you'd be right. The European Parliament is mentally ill ... The single currency was always as terrible an idea as walking through Damascus with an 'I hate Muslims' T-shirt would be. You just knew it would cause pain and suffering ..." (source - Capitalist Exploits)

The global economy was struggling long before Brexit, but it did serve to open a real can of worms. Central Banks around the world have intervened heavily in the stock and bond markets before and since then, but it is now very obvious that a major secular decline is underway, and the consequences will be worse than the crisis of 2007. There is panic in the high circles of the elite and they will use all means available, both to prevent Brexit, and to stop other countries from leaving the EU. This, however, may be too late. Already Holland, Denmark, Czech Republic, even Germany's AfD nationalist party, have indicated that they wish to hold referenda. In France, Marine LePen of the Front Nationale, who will likely be the next President, has demanded a referendum. In Italy, the 5-Star Movement, led by Beppe Grillo, just won 8 of 9 Mayoralty elections, including Rome, and is decidedly anti-EU. On May 22nd, Austria's right-wing Freedom Party narrowly lost an election for President by 31,000 votes. Just last week, Austria's Constitutional Court ruled that, due to massive voter fraud, the election must be held again, giving the candidate, Norbert Hofer, another chance to become President. He is firmly antiimmigrant and anti-EU. His election would install the first right-wing Head of State in Europe since WW2.

The voter fraud in Austria indicates the length to which elites will go in order to preserve the dying status quo. Just days ago, Foreign Policy Magazine ran a shocking editorial titled, "It's Time for the Elites to Rise Up Against the Ignorant Masses." The author is James Traub, an establishment, neo-con elite, who pointed out that this political schism of our time is not about the right vs the left, but about the sane vs the mindlessly angry. Ergo, the ignorant masses are mindlessly angry.

> No kidding! I wonder why? Could it be you guys, in your ivory towers, have been robbing us blind for decades, without giving a damn for the well-being of the rest of society? What do you call 90 months of ZIRP and NIRP, if not robbery of savers, investors, bond holders, small businesses, pension funds and insurance companies that are the vital, stabilising elements of any healthy society? What do you call insanely high, manipulated stock markets, while the world is drowning in too much debt? Of course people are hopping mad, and they are not going to take it anymore!

> That's why we have Donald Trump and Bernie Sanders in the US, and why Billary, no, Killary, must go to back to Arkansas instead of the White House. People are fed up and demand a change of the old order. That's why nationalist

Simply Words on Paper I May Be Old But I'm **Not Dead Yet**

I am in the cast of a play, Les anges gardiens sont fatigués that explores a range of issues related to the stresses imposed on caregivers. A couple of the scenarios presented focus on the loss of identity

experienced by those who must abandon careers or other cherished activities in order to care for a loved one.

Many of the cast members are at the pre-retirement or retirement stages in their lives. Some have already experienced the deprivations, which very often accompany the caregiver role, whether for a spouse, family member or friend.

Several cast members were friends or acquaintances of mine before we all engaged in this current endeavor. Others were total strangers that I only met during the casting stage. With rehearsals, travel and get-togethers related to the staging of the play, I have learned of, and come to appreciate, the very diverse careers and life experiences of these occasional, but enthusiastic and dedicated, performers.

Expanding the concept to a more general level, I came to see that many of the people "of a certain age" that I meet or befriend are only known to me by their current role or station in life. It is easy to ignore that they may have worked, lived or experienced environments far different from mine. Their achievements and the challenges they may have overcome remain in shadow. Reaching retirement age, whether well-prepared or not, should not signify that you must abandon any status you have attained.

For instance, I am well-acquainted with a group of retired teachers who meet regularly for a social evening. I have been a guest in the classroom of several of these teachers. Their level of skill, broad knowledge and ability to motivate students was truly remarkable.



Accumulated experience

If you were to found a charter school, with the recruitment of an excellent, experienced staff as your highest priority, you would be well advised to attempt to entice members of this group to form the core of your administrative or teaching staff. Few, if any, would likely respond, as they have acclimatized to other roles, but their superior skill sets are undeniable. Except for their colleagues and appreciative former students, if you were to cross paths with one or more of the group, you would be likely to categorize them as "just some retirees."

A relative of mine retired some years ago after a full career in industrial design, planning and construction. Because of his dogged thoroughness, attention to detail and extensive real-world experience, former employers enticed him to return to provide his expertise on current projects, particularly when it involved re-certifying or re-furbishing a plant where he had been involved in the initial construction phase.

On one particular project, a group of young, academically well-trained but inexperienced engineers so frequently sought his advice or input that they began to refer to him as Yoda, the sage of Star Wars fame. He was unaware of what a compliment and show of appreciation on their part that this entailed. I had to explain in detail the exalted status of his alter ego. As a testament to his valued contributions, they gifted him with a briefcase inscribed with the Yoda name at the conclusion of the project. Since his ultimate retirement, he might well be dismissed by someone who encounters him for the first time as "a guy who is in pretty fair shape and seems to know a lot about tools and gadgets."

Varied backgrounds

In essence, what I am urging you to do, particularly when dealing with those "of a certain age" is to be just a little more inquisitive, most likely by asking a few open-ended questions. You may well discover that many, if not most, can give you the benefit of their extensive and varied backgrounds.

The title of this text, "I may be old, but I'm not dead yet" is an adaptation of a line spoken in an earlier play which dealt with issues related to elder abuse. If you seek to benefit, at least occasionally, from the accumulated experience amassed through toil, time and assumed challenges by some of our more "experienced" residents, you may gain some wisdom without needing to consult Google, or at least acquire some great, funny or even atrocious stories to share with friends.

The great outdoors



Anders, Charlie Jane - All The Birds in the Sky




Hébert, Marie France - Where in the World

Willems, Mo - I Really Like Slop



of consultations on a number of pressing issues to help it make decisions that are consistent with the values and interests of Canadians. The topics include the design of the federal sustainable development strategy, the Employment Insurance service quality review, the important issue of electoral reform and the in-depth review of Canada Post's services. These consultations are part of a new commitment to participatory democracy.

"Canadians clearly want to be more involved in the government's decision-making process. That is why we want to develop programs and policies with more grassroots input. Too often, governments impose decisions that are out of touch with the facts on the ground, so we decided to take a different approach. But we are counting on Canadians to take advantage of this opportunity and let us know what matters to them," added Graham.

Off-Road Vehicles Regulations

The council of Grenville-sur-la-Rouge adopted a long-awaited by-law at its June 14 meeting, on the use of off-road vehicles (snowmobiles, quads and motocross) on certain municipal roads.



In a nutshell, the new by-law allows local residents to obtain an annual sticker, at the cost of 15 dollars, which will allow them to drive on the secondary roads north

of Highway 50, on the condition that they respect a few basic rules of safety, and that they respect other residents. Kilmar and Harrington roads, as well as Scotch road, below McGillivray, will not be accessible by off-road users, because of the heavy truck traffic. Motocross bikes, which are not licensed by the SAAQ, will not be authorized anywhere. In fact, the Act respecting off-highway vehicles gives the power to municipalities to adopt by-laws allowing the use of off-road vehicles on certain roads.

Mayor Saywell sees a compromise. "Local residents will be able to maintain their lifestyle, using the quads and snowmobiles to gain access to the rural area. But, any abuse will earn the driver or owner a revocation of their privileges, in addition to their fines," he added.

For off-road enthusiasts from outside the community, the municipality is working with the Club Quad Basses-Laurentides, snow mobile clubs, and the equestrian club, to promote the development of touring trails throughout the Municipality. "But these trails will, as much as possible, avoid public roads and inhabited areas" Mr. Saywell insisted. The Municipality did approve the final route for the provincial quad trail that follows the Highway 50 corridor.

Application of the by-law will be implemented in collaboration with the Highways Department and the Sûreté du Québec.

Launching of the Accompanying Justice and Mental Health Program: A First in Quebec!

Representatives of the Criminal Division of the Court of Québec in Saint-Jérôme, Corrections Laurentides, Legal Aid, and the Integrated Health and Social Services Centre (CISSS) Laurentides, recently gathered to officially launch the accompanying justice and mental health program. The first partnership agreement of its kind in Quebec, the program in question will adapt the services offered to individuals who have committed a criminal offense, and who, at the time of the act, had indicators of mental health problems.

With this new approach, stakeholders of the justice system and the health and social services hope to ensure the safety of the population, and to support people with mental health problems. To do this, individuals will provide care appropriate to their situation in the context of an action plan developed by all partners. The aim is to allow the person to address the mental health problems that led him/her to commit a crime, to prevent such a situation from happening again and to protect society from another possible crime.

"The CISSS Laurentides is proud to be associated with this wonderful collaboration experience that goes directly to its mission to ensure the well-being of the population by timely access to quality services appropriate to their needs," stressed Deputy CEO of Laurentian CISSS, Daniel Corbeil.

Project Optilab

There will be no lab closures in the Laurentians

The management of the Centre for Integrated Health and Social Services (CISSS) of the Laurentians wishes to inform the population that no closures of medical laboratories operating in the Laurentians are expected, even if the project Optilab, which aims to optimize their activities, is ongoing.

Contrary to what has recently been claimed in some media, laboratories, which are found in hospitals in Saint-Eustache, Saint-Jérôme, Lachute, Sainte-Agathe-des-Monts, Rivière-Rouge and Mont Laurier will continue to operate. Their activities will be reorganized in the coming years, but there is no intention to close them.

The Optilab project aims to reorganize the laboratory services in order to meet the growing needs of the population and to take advantage of technological advances that facilitate the work being done there. This project is currently being deployed throughout Québec. Therefore, the laboratories of the Laval, Laurentides and Lanaudière regions will be grouped. The laboratory of the Hospital of the Cité de la Santé in Laval has been designated as a server, where a majority of laboratory tests will be done. However, analysis from inpatient and emergencies, or analyses that cannot be transported, will continue to be processed in local laboratories, to continue their complementary operations.

Because of its scope, the Optilab project will continue to modify its operations over the coming years, with special attention being given to minimize the impact of this reorganization on existing staff.

Road Repairs

The Minister of Transport would like to inform the population that, as of July 11, there will be a complete access closure on Chemin du Tour-du-Lac in Saint-Adolphe d'Howard. Repairs to the bridge on this road will be ongoing for two weeks. Road users are asked to exercise prudence while following the designated detour around the lake and are thanked for their cooperation and patience.

St. Mungo's United Church was originally Presbyterian, built in 1836 by British settlers who worshipped at "Great Hall" (a Methodist church) across the road. In a Class of Their Own

We couldn't do what we do without the support of people who care. Grandmothers, teachers, bankers - it takes in-

dividuals from all walks of life to marshal the resources needed to help animals in distress, and to make a better world for our four-legged friends.

And then there are the nine students from Montreal who formed a group called The Selwyn House School Dog Defenders - DD Boys for short. These dedicated teens set two campaign objectives for their extracurricular program: raising funds for emergency animal sheltering and educationawareness on the issue of puppy mills.

Not only did they achieve their goals - they wildly surpassed them. The DD Boys' initial fundraising goal



was to raise \$1,000 for Humane Society International/Canada's Stop Puppy Mills campaign and emergency shelters. After giving presentations for elementary and middle school classes, they raised an impressive \$4,127. There's no magic formula to their success; they wanted to make a difference, and, that's exactly what they did. The group's fundraising strategy included bake sales, popcorn sales and creating a school "Dog Board" allowing students to post pictures of themselves with their dogs on the board for a \$2 donation. Along the way, they also encouraged people to "adopt not shop."

The DD Boys' help comes at a time when it's needed most; there are more puppy mills in Quebec than anywhere else in Canada. In fact, 90 percent of puppies sold in Quebec pet stores come from puppy mills. In puppy mills, animals are raised under horribly inhumane conditions, destined for sale on the Internet, or to pet stores. Males and females too old to breed, are often killed or left to die.

What can you do to help fight puppy mills and ensure better conditions for companion animals? If you're planning on bringing a pet into your life, opt to adopt. Animal shelters are bursting at the seams with adoptable pets who need loving homes, and you'd be doing your part to help end the vicious cycle of pets-for-profit. You can also donate much-needed materials to your local animal shelter, namely old blankets, new dog toys, and even cardboard and newspaper.

If you choose to purchase a dog from a breeder, make sure you are dealing with one that is responsible and reputable. Visit the premises where your puppy was raised and make sure you meet both its parents.


















The Teacher Behind the 30-Year Record






















Garden Talk Peonies Pack a Punch



Peonies are perennial flowering wonders. Shoots first appear mid-May and by late June flower buds

are bobbing on meter high foliage ready to burst into spectacular frothy blooms of white, various shades of pink or red. Once blooms fade, the lush, glossy leaves continue to green up a garden all summer long before turning purplish or gold in

Peonies are hardy enough for our Laurentian growing zones 3 to 5. They are easy to care for as long as they are planted properly and allowed to establish themselves. These plants can endure a long time in a garden; some have been known to thrive for 100 years, so they make a great investment. Individual plants make a showy addition to a perennial bed, or when planted in a row, they create a lovely low hedge.

Peonies don't require at lot of work. Deadhead peony blooms as soon as they begin to fade. Cut the foliage to the ground in the fall to avoid any overwintering disease. They



Peonies basically require full sun and rich moist soil that drains well. New plants are often sold as bare-root tubers. These should be planted in late September or October. Set the root so the eyes face up and cover with only about 2 inches of soil. Water thoroughly. Once established, peonies don't like to be moved. But if you must, fall is the best time. I have done it and they survived and actually thrived better in their new home.

Young plants in nursery pots are also available and can be planted fall or spring. If done in spring they will only settle in and produce the following season. To plant, loosen the soil and mix in generous amounts of compost, then place the plant in the ground with the top of the root-ball level with the soil, taking care not to disrupt tender feeder roots.

Plant peonies where there is some shelter from strong winds. Heavy rain and gusty winds can do a lot of damage to heavy blooms. You can give flowers a bit of support by inserting a few discreet bamboo stakes around a blooming plant joined by string. Once the flowers are deadheaded, remove the stakes. Cages such as those used for tomatoes can also be inserted early spring allowing the new plant to grow up through the support structure. Don't try to remove these until fall when cutting back the plant.

Unlike most perennials, peonies don't need to be dug up and divided. They require little if any fertilizing. But if your soil is poor, the time to apply fertilizer, such as bone meal or compost, is early summer, after the blooms are finished.

If you see lots of ants crawling around your peony buds or blooms don't fret. The ants love the nectar, don't damage the plants and disappear once the flowers have faded. Peonies make great cut flowers for beautiful indoor bouquets, so remember to give them a gentle but thorough shake to dislodge any ants before bringing them in the house.

Plant and enjoy for many years to come!







Healthy Channels Clearing Up the Qi

What is Qi? Well, if you were to ask the majority of people (including acupuncturists) for a one-word

definition of Qi, the answer would be "energy." However, if you were to look up the definition of Qi in any reputable Chinese medical dictionary you might be surprised to find that energy is not even a choice! There would be about ten or twelve possible definitions depending on the context of the word. The most common translation for Qi is "air" or "vital air," which we can then guess to mean oxygen. So why does everyone think Qi means energy?

The most ancient text describing Chinese medicine and acupuncture is called the Huang Di Nei Jing. It was written about 2,000 years ago on 18 scrolls. Fully translated, those 18 scrolls would fill about 800 pages. However, this text has never been fully translated into English. Now keep in mind how difficult it would be to translate from ancient Chinese into modern English. Qi was never translated to mean energy until 1939, when a French diplomat, named Soulie de



Morant, partially translated the Nei Jing into French. He had lived for some time in India as well, so one can only guess that he assumed Qi in Chinese medicine was the same as Prana, which does mean energy, in Ayurvedic medicine.

Due to this continual mistranslation, acupuncture has been improperly assumed to be an energy medicine, where a patient's improvement is thought to be due to the patient's 'energy' becoming more balanced.

However, if one looks more closely into the ancient Nei Jing text, one can see that the Chinese writers were actually very much concerned with physical medicine, and actually performed many dissections of cadavers, in order to better understand how the body worked. They wrote about the average weight of individual organs, which would be impossible without dissecting the human body. There is never mention of famous sages who discovered that mystical energy flows throughout the body in energy channels called meridians. In fact, the meridians are another mistranslation by Soulie de Morant, and create another misunderstanding of Chinese medicine, which I will try to correct in next month's issue.

I hope this gives you a better understanding about acupuncture and how it works. The process was also exhausting.

My climb up, from the depths over the last 25 years, is not yet over. I still have something important to accomplish, to share. The feeling is strong. Is it the mountains, here in Whistler, and the expansive nature of the environment, that are making me reflect this way? Let's see what life has in store for me next.

I invite you to look into your life and map the journey. What golden nugget will you find? Bon voyage, mes amis.





The Exopolitics of ET contact: A Report from 2016 Alien Cosmic Expo

In several interviews presidential candidate Hillary Clinton has teased the public with media tidbits about extra-terrestrial disclosure. If elected, she states, she will share what the government knows about contact with ETs, if it does not compromise national security. Thousands of documented cases of ET contact, classified as Above-Top-Secret, have been buried by media distortion and manipulation. The cover-up of human and extra-terrestrial (ET) contact is one of the largest issues that major world governments are facing today.

Lying to the public about an ET presence began during WW II, when Churchill decided not to inform the public about Foo fighters. The glowing orbs observed the air battles between Allied and Nazi aircraft. President Truman later continued the "Truth Embargo" on Extra Terrestrial craft sightings. From 1947 to the present time, a strategy was employed by MJ-12 to completely cover up reports of Unidentified Aerial Phenomena (UAP); hidden were the recovery of crashed ET vehicles and the huge back-engineering programs to incorporate ET technology. The sudden appearance of night-vision goggles in the Vietnam War, or micro-circuitry in computer development, and many other hi-tech gizmos, have a dubious paper trail.

According to physicist and long-time Truth Embargo investigator, Stanton Friedman, there is, since 1947, a secret collection of data, controlled by a very competent group of individuals that is making decisions about ET Contact. Created by President Truman, this most secret arm of the CIA, originally called the Majestic 12 (MJ 12), was composed of military and scientific heavyweights. Founding members included General Hillen Koetter, Secretary of Defense Forrestal, General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, scientists like Jerome Clarke Hunsaker and imported Nazi scientist Donald Menzel. Working in the black world, beneath mainstream politics for years, this group has left a trail of memos and meetings about UAP incidents that never made it to public media. UAP events that were deemed so "disturbing" to American military security that no documentation was made public for seven decades. At a recent conference in Brampton, Ontario, Friedman presented page after page of documents on undisclosed events, released under the Freedom of Information Act. The documents, obviously pertaining to ET incidents and encounters, are redacted to 3 or 4 lines per page, or many are completely whited out. Based on his research, Friedman believes that ET contacts and treaties may have already occurred between specific governments and several different species of ET. He believes, as do many, including John Podesta, Hillary Clinton's campaign advisor, that full disclosure to the public is only a matter of time.

Meanwhile, reported cases of ET contact with humans have been growing amongst private citizens not affiliated with any government or military organization. The most astounding is that of a Swiss farmer named Billy Meier. He was born on Feb 3, 1937. His first contacts with ETs are recorded to be with human-like life forms, from the Pleiadian/Plejaren Federation and, to date, he has 431 documented contact reports. His case was first examined by investigators in 1975 and, since that time, Mr. Meier has written thousands of pages of transcript on topics such as creation origins, Earth history, science, astronomy, spirituality, genetic engineering, interplanetary space flight, overpopulation of the Earth and the destruction of Earth environments - not subjects usually associated with a simple farmer. He has been permitted to take hundreds of photographs and videos. The photos and films have been closely scrutinized by professionals. The videos show flying ships and multiple craft. He has strong support worldwide, based on a number of global event predictions that have come true.

Globally, there are huge implications, for outing ET contact. In developed countries, vast numbers of citizens have abandoned traditional religions and are very comfortable with the idea that we are not alone. Even the Pope has absurdly stepped forward, ready to baptize ETs into the fold of the Catholic faith. The changes to our thinking, to our belief systems, to our educational institutions, will be profound. But not right away.

The day after disclosure, chances are you will get out of bed, go make a cup of coffee and scroll through the news to check the weather and what exoplanetary IPOs will be offered on the TSX. Chances are you will still have a bowl of Cheerios. The day after disclosure, life will go on. But, one day, a grandchild of yours may be going to university in another star system.

The Story Behind Inspired by the Arts

I took great pleasure in attending my last concert of the season at Diffusions Amal'gamme in Prévost, where we listened to Philippe Prud'homme, a pianist, composer and music historian. Over the past eight years, we have enjoyed three of his concerts, each one entertaining and informative. He turns 25 this year. That means we have been following him since he was seventeen. Diffusions Amal'Gamme's programme includes a series called Jeunes Virtuoses, which highlights young performers who have al-



ready made a name for themselves in classical music. Some of these concerts are among the most inspiring events you are likely to be able to attend in the Laurentians. These young people are passionate artists who have dedicated their youth to their art, and good art is an elixir that can inspire and transform, an essential component of a happy life.

In early June, we followed our hearts to what, on the face of it, may sound humdrum. We attended the three-day annual convention of the Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network (QAHN). It is anything but humdrum. Each year, we have had the opportunity to listen to serious artists and historians describe aspects of their work. This year, we had the pleasure of attending a conference given – in English – by Serge Malenfant, founder of MURIRS, an acronym in French for Urban Murals for the Revitalization of Buildings



and Social Reconciliation, a name that sounds like a mission statement that they fulfill in all its declarations. Their first mural was unveiled in 2002 as a part of Sherbrooke's bicentennial celebrations, and a further 23 murals have been added since in both Sherbrooke and Lennoxville.

Somewhat skeptical that murals were a valid form of art or expression of history, I doubted that this would be the highlight of the trip, but as Serge Malenfant spoke and explained their work, I became increasingly enamoured. These are not some form of domesticated graffiti. They start with a contract that guarantees the long-term survival of the project, the legal rights to the space, and that is followed by years of historical and technical research that includes examination of the structure, how to refinish it to be able to receive a complex, integrated painting that can span an 80 foot wall, what happened on that spot throughout the history of Sherbrooke and who were the people of the times that are to be represented. On the business side, it also involves soliciting community support and money – these murals can run from \$75,000 to twice that. In most of the cases, the canvas for the mural is a massive horizontal slab of windowless concrete facing an otherwise attractive streetscape.

Aside from artistic expression, the other priorities listed in their name are very serious. A massive, blank concrete or brick wall can be more than an eyesore. It is lifeless and can detract from the pleasure people take in being in a place. Their objective is to transfer, not just the wall, but the community space surrounding it. Malenfant described one story of a large blank wall that stood across a fairly busy road from a seniors' residence. One of the residents, who fought against having to move there, is a good example of how the beautification improves people's lives. On the day that the team arrived to set up scaffolds, the elderly lady's curtain was firmly closed, her balcony unused. As work began, they noticed that the curtain opened a crack, and then more. Malenfant described artists who are happy in their crafts and were an uplifting presence on a previously drab street. As the colours and images were added to the massive wall, the tenant across the street took greater pleasure in the development of the mural. The curtain opened in the morning. Eventually she enjoyed sitting on her balcony and telling people about the massive tableau that became her cherished view.

In another case, the muralists could document a revitalization of the immediate neighbourhood thanks to a more pleasant environment. An ice-cream stand opened up to offer something to the many people who came to see one of the murals. A park nearby became a more pleasant destination. The stories are numerous.

Malenfant's talk took us out of the office of the Sherbrooke Historical Society and into the streets to see for ourselves. One of the murals we examined, as he described it in detail, became an historic re-enactment. "Those three men..." he told us pointing at three businessmen talking happily in one corner of the mural outside the painted door of a mural of what was once Boutique Skinner, "they never would have talked together in real life - they hated each other." Then he proceeded to tell us why, basing his recounting on one of them, Daniel McManamy, the 1890s mayor who expropriated land for the electrical company that's still owned by the town. In the representation, we imagine he is discussing the merits of the public utility with Frank Shea, a pulp and paper baron and Richard Heneker, the commissioner who controlled the dams, or did at least until then.

Along with the serious history, the murals contain details like a squirrel running along a telegraph wire or, as Malenfant guarantees, the ever-present leprechaun. It's in every mural. The quality of artwork is so good that Malenfant told us of one journalist who asked one of the characters, painted into the mural, if he could stand aside so she could take a photograph of the mural. Even knowing this, I found myself, a bit later, approaching the painting of a general store hoping to make a purchase.

If you can't get to the next QAHN convention in Montreal or to Sherbrooke to see the murals, you can still enjoy the Jeunes Virtuoses at Diffusion Amal'Gamme in nearby Prévost. Or you may have found your own muse in Laurentian arts. Let Sue MacDonald or Ilania Abileah of Main Street know – or tell me.

Policy for Family and Seniors of the MRC d'Argenteuil

The MRC d'Argenteuil, and its nine constituent municipalities, recently launched their Family and Seniors Policy, along with the action plans that will soon follow. This policy will integrate the reflex "think and act - Families / Seniors," in the planning and administration of projects to enhance the vitality and well-being of seniors and their families.

In December 2013, thanks to financial assistance of \$82,000 from the Secrétariat aux Aînés, the MRC d'Argenteuil and municipalities were engaged in the project "Municipality Friend of Seniors" (MADA), to rethink all services available for seniors. In January 2015, the MRC council decided to do the same for families, this time, with grants totaling \$57,500 (\$15,000 for the MRC d'Argenteuil and \$42,500 for the nine local municipalities) as part of the support program for municipal family policies of the ministère de la Famille.

With the invaluable financial support of the Government of Quebec, more than 700 municipalities and MRCs have engaged in a MADA approach, and the number is equally important regarding municipal family policies.

The work, spread over nearly two years, mobilized nearly a hundred citizens, partners, elected officials, and municipal employees, concerned about the well-being and quality of life for families and seniors, across the territory of the MRC of Argenteuil. A local committee has been set up within each of the constituent municipalities to participate in the development of regional policy. Primarily formed of citizens, the committees have piloted a brilliantly extensive consultation of the population: 1,390 questionnaires were completed and more than 35 families and 120 seniors participated in one of 27 organized focus groups.

The action plans indicate the measures envisaged to meet the needs expressed during the citizen consultations in the following areas of intervention:

- Housing and living environment
- Security
- Transport
- Health and Community Support
 Social Participation
- Communication
- Managing and Monitoring

The MRC d'Argenteuil wishes to underline the remarkable contribution of citizens and community partners invested in the approach: Carrefour Jeunesse-Emploi, Volunteer Argenteuil Cooperative, Helping Hand Argenteuil Committee local Action Argenteuil, CISSS Laurentians, Family House in the heart of Argenteuil generations, Québec en Forme Argenteuil, Sûreté du Québec, youth and Table Argenteuil, Argenteuil Word to seniors. 



I'm Just Saying Don't Shoot the Messenger

It would appear that following the tragic events

in Brussels, Paris, Tel Aviv, Orlando and scores more locations, wherein gun violence took the lives of many innocent people, the same old tired rhetoric still prevails. It is true that lawn darts and Kinder Surprise are banned in the U.S.A., yet assault weapons are not. It is also true that there are many hunters who are responsible people and not cold-blooded murderers. Herein lies the tired old Republican dialogue, which is fanned by the N.R.A gun lobby regurgitating the adage that "guns don't kill people, people kill people."

Allow me to throw the notion that "if we do not learn from history, we are doomed to repeat it," as we bear witness to countless massacres perpetuated by the mere fact that gun access in the United States is not monitored and it is as easy to purchase a weapon as it is to buy a Pez dispenser. There will be more and more mass killings with gun control in its present tepid state. People will again explain that terrorism, the issue of bullied youth turning on his or her aggressors, to name a few, are the real causes. This is a manufactured half-truth. Sadly, our world is in a horrible conflict with radical extremism, and we need to confront and defeat this real threat. 
What's Your Next Move? Career Planning for Artists

For many, summer is the time of year to slow down and enjoy the hot sunny days but if you're a self-employed artist, it can be an ideal time to plan for the year ahead. Here are some strategic tips on how to map out your career so that by this time next year, you are exactly where you want to be.

Getting the Lay of the Land

Any achievable career plan needs to be practical and realistic. So, before you go about listing goals, you need to have a clear understanding of the local arts environment, and where you fit into it. The clearer your understanding, the easier it is to steer your goals towards success.



A large part of gathering this information involves leveraging your network, so maintain connections with peers, collaborators, agents and anyone that has insights into your industry and who might help you identify career opportunities. Summer is a great time for networking.

Goal Setting

With an understanding of the local arts environment in mind, the planning stage can begin! As with all goals, yours should be: Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Timebased (SMART).

When listing goals, go into detail - if you plan to exhibit your work in a gallery later next year, break down all the actions you need to take to make that happen i.e. venue booking, sending invites, and organizing catering.

And don't forget to give yourself deadlines – this way you'll ensure that your professional goals don't fall by the wayside.

Money Matters

Unfortunately, plans to launch your next exhibition or latest play won't go anywhere if you can't afford to implement them. So part of your 12-month career plan should involve budgeting.

Map out your predicted expenses for the year (venue hire, cost of materials etc.) as well as your planned sources of income to see which projects you'll be able to carry out, and which ones can be left until later on.

Grants often play a large role in any artist's finances, so make a list of all relevant ones coming up in the next 12 months. You don't want to miss out on a potential source of funding just because you missed the deadline, so note closing dates too.

For anyone serious about making their art their livelihood, career planning should be taken seriously. Take advantage of this summer by mapping out how you can turn your artistic dreams into a reality.

Moisson Laurentides: Helping Feed the Laurentians over 18,788 hours annually in pursuit of this mission. With new inv

I recently learned that Moisson is the French word for harvest, which is an appropriate name for this

organization. Of course, as English-speaking people, we would not necessarily know this word or what this organization does. They most often go unrecognized and yet they touch almost every single community in the Laurentians.

Moisson Laurentides is a food bank that, in partnership with the community, fights hunger and feeds hope in the Laurentians. Their territory extends from Ferme-Neuve in the north to Rivière-des-Mille-Îles in the south, and, from east to west between Lachenaie and Grenville-sur-la-Rouge. Basically, they solicit, collect, sort, store and distribute perishable and non-perishable groceries weekly to 78 accredited community organizations throughout the Laurentians. By supplying these organizations with the necessary food, Moisson Laurentides allows them to focus their efforts on direct intervention with people in need to maximize the positive effects. Just in the Laurentians, more than 21,657 people, 36.5 % being children, use a food bank at least once a month. Moisson Laurentides ultimate goal is to combat hunger and alleviate the financial burden on people, allowing them the time to improve their situation and become independent.

Moisson Laurentides distributes more than 2.9 million kilograms of food and other essential products, representing a market value of over 16 million dollars per year. Every day, Moisson Laurentides sends their 4 refrigerated trucks on the road to collect the donated goods from more than 200 suppliers across the region. These local suppliers range from farmers and market gardeners to wholesalers, distributors, large chains and food processing companies. The harvest is then sorted and redistributed to the community organizations. Dedicated volunteers do most of this work; nearly 2,160 of them contribute

over 18,788 hours annually in pursuit of this mission. With new inventory daily, planning is very difficult and every day is a challenge. It is a continuous race against time to get the harvest to the community before it spoils.

Despite the heavy load carried by Moisson Laurentides, it is also responsible for assembling and distributing all the Good Food Boxes in the Laurentians. Approximately 700 food boxes are delivered every second week across 7 MRCs. Of all the groceries distributed through community organizations in the Laurentians, Moisson Laurentides supplies between 80 and 100% depending on the year.

Moisson Laurentides does so much for our communities and yet so very few people are aware of it. For more information on this organization, visit their website at: www. moissonlaurentides.org. Unfortunately, it is completely in French at this time.






